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Meet the Follow Up Teams

The British Columbia (BC) Pediatric Oncology Long-term Follow-up (LTFU) Program is a provincial program that provides surveillance and management of the risk of recurrence and late effects after treatment for childhood cancer. With current therapies, 83% of children with cancer will become long-term survivors. However, the cost of cure can pose a significant risk of chronic health conditions that span a broad spectrum of issues, including secondary cancers, heart disease, lung disease, endocrinopathies, physical impairment, psychosocial distress, developmental and learning disorders. The multidisciplinary team supports the diverse needs of this population based on the individual patient's risks to allow for prevention, early detection, and treatment of late effects. We work in close collaboration with other subspecialty teams and deliver care using the best model for the patient and family, including telehealth, outreach, and shared care with regional care providers. For patients who are at least 18 years old, 5 years off treatment and are at high risk of late effects, they are transferred to the Late Effects, Assessment, and Follow-Up (LEAF) Clinic at BC Cancer. The LEAF clinic was created jointly by BC Cancer and BC Children's Hospital (BCCH) for adult childhood cancer survivors. The LEAF Clinic's mission is to ensure that pediatric cancer survivors receive the best care as they are at risk for health complications later in life, called late effects, that may vary over time. The program helps provide survivors with the latest information, support, and ongoing assessment. Late effects vary for each survivor and depend on factors such as diagnosis, age, and treatment.

Dr. Kristin Marr, MD, MHSc, FRCPC

Dr. Marr received her MD from the University of Toronto, followed by residency training in Pediatrics and Pediatric Oncology and Hematology at BCCH. She completed her Masters in Health Sciences at the University of British Columbia (UBC) in 2017. She is the medical lead of the Pediatric
